LSF Northern California Children and Family Services Program Update

ife Steps Foundation has expanded its partnership with Contra Costa County Libraries to help meet unmet needs in the community by providing a circle time and playgroup for families with children 18-months-old to three-years-old. The groups are led by two infant development specialists at the Ygnacio Valley Library in Walnut Creek. This partnership began in January 2024 and we are currently doing our fourth session of the playgroups. Each session consists of five to six groups designed for children who have developmental delays. Families have an opportunity to connect with other families, as well as consult with two infant development specialists. The children have the chance to learn and play in a supportive environment. During the group, the children, parents, grandparents and siblings dance, sing and listen to stories and play. We begin with a circle time, followed by the opportunity to explore age-appropriate activities and play together. The children who have joined show new skills each week and have fun. They participate more each time, recognize and use each others' names, and are more comfortable playing with other children. There has been a consistent group of families that sign up for each session, showing that they enjoy the groups. We have enjoyed our partnership with the Contra Costa County Libraries and are grateful they have supported our program to help serve families and address unmet needs in our community.

uke started to receive our services at the age of 24 months with very little speech and a short attention span. He was scared and hesitant to play with any unfamiliar adults or peers. He also had limited interest in toys,



and he often walked away from activities without trying. After receiving our services for several months, Luke started to imitate more sounds and words. He also showed more curiosity and interests in a variety of toys and activities. He usually got excited when he saw the early interventionist walk into his home and could not wait to begin to play. His language started to flow into 2-3 word sentences, and he actively participated in all the activities with great focus. The only problem was that he did not want his session to end each time! When Luke exited our program, he was speaking in long sentences and even began to tell stories from a book.



LSF SoCal Adult Services: Interview with Program Coordinator Robert Turner

What brought you to LSF?

I started at LSF on January 26, 1999. I started as a CSF, called IHF (In-home Facilitator) back then. I was referred by one of my employees, Sherry Nelson, who also worked at LSF at that time.

What motivates you while at work?

My clients motivate me. I enjoy seeing them every day.

Was there ever an extradorinary outcome of a program participant you witnessed?

I remember well one interaction I had with a teenager in the Getting Hip program. This particular young man was very involved on the autistic spectrum and was my first nonverbal client. I did not understand him well at first, but I grew to like him very much. He liked to do art projects, but always alone. Since he arrived early, I would often sit with him while we waited for other members to show up. One day we were sitting together side-by-side and quite unexpectedly he reached over to me and touched his cheek to my cheek. It only lasted for about two seconds and then he moved his face away. I didn't know what to think of this at first. When it happened the next day too, I realized that this young man was expressing himself to me in a way that he knew how to and felt comfortable doing, either saying hello or expressing affection. I must admit that I felt a little overwhelmed by this.

What's your most memorable experience at LSF?


I have worked with kids and young adults that now are 35-40 years old, living on their own. I'm still heavily involved in their lives even today. I feel gratified that I have been able to impact their lives and see them grow into productive, active members of their communities.

What's your favorite part of working at LSF?

I enjoy working with the clients, I feel useful to them. I have worked here long enough to see them grow in their skills and confidence.

What are your hopes for the future of LSF?

I hope that LSF continues to grow and offer services to clients throughout California. It would be nice to see the Seaside Learning Center and New Adventures program also in new locations across the state.
